The Alphabet Around Us - Read the words you already know and hear the letter sounds.

Emotions Cards - Cut the cards apart. Speak face to face with your child so they can connect sounds and expressions. It is important for your child to be able to communicate how they are feeling with their teacher.

Scissor Skills - Cutting allows a child to build the fine motor skills in their hands, use their eyes and hands to cut properly, and use both sides of the body at the same time. Practice cutting scrap paper and magazines, too.

Letter Tracing - Practice tracing capital and lowercase letters.

Counting and Coloring - Color the correct number of boxes.

Fine Motor Skills at Home

Help your child develop strength & motor control Make it FUN and hands on!

- Fine motor skills involve using small muscles in hands and fingers. It is the ability to pick up small things, cut with scissors, draw and write.
- To increase these skills:
- Tear paper and make a collage
- Do a variety of puzzles
- Peel and stick stickers or tape to paper
- Build or play with legos or blocks
- Color and write with broken crayons
- Trace objects
- String beads, noodles or cereal onto yarn



- Use tweezers to pick up cotton balls, marshmallows, cereal or other small items
- Use your finger to make lines, shapes and numbers in flour or sand on a cookie sheet
- Allow your child to cut paper, newspaper, leaves, playdough, ribbon, and other items.
- Play with playdough, rolling the dough into snakes, pinching off pieces, creating objects, using cookie cutters, and making prints with buttons, sea shells, toothpicks and other items.
- Water play using containers with lids, squirt bottles, spray bottles, sponges, tongs and tweezers (in the tub or in the sink) is fun and also helps build some fine motor skills and muscles.

Clothespin Positional Activity

Parent Info:

- I. Understanding positional words enables a child to follow directions and creates an understanding of relationships between objects. Eventually, a command of positional words will help children with math concepts.
- 2. Let this activity be a time of sharing fun. You can use any item in place of the clothespin. Try gummy bears or legos. Children learn best through play!

Supplies:

2 cups and I clothespin

Instructions:

I. Place the cups upside down and side by side on the table. Ask your child to do the following with the clothespin:



2. Explain which cup is to the **RIGHT** and which is to the **LEFT**. Ask your child to place the clothespin on the right cup or the left cup.
